In this article, I want to highlight some of the things I see from my station at the "C" elevator. Every Tuesday I sit at the information podium for four hours, helping persons find their destination in the hospital. Sometimes it is just confirming what they think is the right way or using a hospital map to give them a visual of how to get from here to there.

What is even more rewarding for me is to watch other Guest Ambassadors giving their best to help others. Here is a short list

of what I observe:

Along with taking a visitor or a small group to see their loved one or friend, they point out landmarks and overhead signs in the halls that can be remembered. Often people are more concerned about getting to their destination than directions. Being sensitive to the visitor's concerns is an attribute I truly appreciate.

None of the volunteers I see each week hesitate to provide wheelchair assistance to those who need it or ask for it. Just last week, one of our volunteers was rushing a mother-to-be to the fourth floor. I saw in both their faces a sense of urgency and learned later that the mission was accomplished.

I take special interest in our juniors who volunteer. When they have a minute to stop by my station, I get to know their names and find out their goal for a career. Most are interested in some field of medicine. This gives me the opportunity to encourage them and build a relationship based on the pursuits they want to follow.

Here are the comments of a Junior Volunteer: "I have had many great opportunities at WakeMed, including my volunteer work and my four-week observership. My volunteer work at WakeMed has allowed me to get exposure to the hospital environment, help people in the community, and serve others in their time of need. This has solidified my interest in the medical field and given me great connections that will benefit me later in my academic and professional journey."

More examples could be given, but these give me added pleasure in my responsibilities at the "C" elevator. Take moments to encourage other volunteers and learn why they are at WakeMed to serve.

Tell me a little bit about yourself outside of WakeMed? I was born in Maryland but moved to North Carolina at an early age (I consider myself a loyal Tar Heel!). I'm very active in my community, and during high school I served as a leader in Student Council, National Honor Society, Science Olympiad (where I was Co-Captain), and my school's Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) chapter (where I was President). I've always had an interest in community service and have been responsible for organizing multiple drives & programs around Cary intended to provide health & food supplies for low-income populations. Science has always been my primary passion, and I hope to pursue a career in the biological sciences in the future ... Soon, our conversation had gone from a typical chat into an hour-long epic ranging in topic from knitting methods to family loss to favorite TV shows By the end of our talk, we'd laughed and cried together, and I knew that I'd helped that patient gain a new sense of inclusion and welcome that they had been missing beforehand. More than anything, I'd helped them feel heard. Hospitals can be big, busy places, and sometimes it's hard to leave time for everyone. Yet, by the end of my shift that day, I knew I'd had a memorable impact on someone's life — every smile had told a story, and every moment had made a difference.




